EXHIBITIONS 2011

The theme of the exhibitions for 2011 was *JOURNEYS: EMOTIONAL*, *PHYSICAL AND SPIRITUAL*. Since our country as a whole was still in an economic crisis, we were all searching for some kind of meaning in our lives. 2011's theme dealt with journeys whether they were physical, spiritual or emotional.

We began our year, from February 1 – March 13, with "The Birds and the Beasts Were There: A Celebration of Animal Life." Whether in the wild or domesticated, animals have always been a major part of our lives. This exhibition examined how artists portray animals in all different media including sculpture, painting, prints, and photographs. All works were for sale and beneficiaries were Audubon's Long Pasture Wildlife Sanctuary and its Coastal Water Bird Program.

Our spring exhibition, from March 15 – May 1, was "Ashes to Ashes & Dust to Dust: Extraordinary Works by Five Cape Cod Potters." The process of pottery is an amazing journey from clay, basically taken out of dirt, to a beautifully finished object. This exhibition looked at potters Ron Dean, Diane Heart, Denny Howard, Kevin Nolan and Gail Turner of Cape Cod. One major part of this exhibition was visits to many of the artists' studios.

Gallery Talks & Activities in 2011

The Cahoon Museum of American Art held nearly 30 gallery talks and activities related to the exhibitions in 2011. Over 20 artists talked about their work or gave demonstrations, and many curators and collectors gave talks or tours as well.

Just to name a few: Donna Dodson talked about carving animal sculptures out of a single log; we went to Diane Heart's studio and watched her amazing skill on the pottery wheel; Richard Waterhouse gave us real insight on how he picked the paintings for the "Lone Figure" exhibition; Anna Carringer came from the Martha's Vineyard Museum and discussed the history of ships, whaling and the problems transporting train engines by ferry; Jim Jenkins told us about his history as a cranberry farmer and collector: and Rose Mosner demonstrated the collage technique.

It was a fasincating year!

From May 3 – June 12, we offered the exhibition "Lone Figure and the Landscape." The lone figure in a landscape tells us much information about the figure. Is the figure a part of the landscape? Is the figure separate from the landscape? Is the landscape important to tell us the story about the figure? Is the landscape part of the journey of the figure? All these questions were examined in this exhibition.

Our summer exhibition, from June 14 – July 24, was "Mighty Ships and Their Journeys to

Wine and Book Discussions

In 2011, the Cahoon Museum of American Art began a wine and book discussion to read and talk about books related to the exhibitions. Some of the books and exhibitions that were paired together included: Marcia Woodruff Dalton's "The Ice Margin" with So What's in a Bog; Sally Gunning's "The Widow's War" with Mighty **Ships and Their Journeys** Beyond; and Oscar Wilde's "The Picture of Dorian Gray" with Portraits & Their Lives. We have had some interesting and lively conversations and the museum is looking forward to continuing the book discussions in 2012.

Beyond." The history of the Cape is full of wonderful ships and ship wrecks throughout the area. This exhibition looked at how important ships have been to the economy and personal pleasure of owners. The history and lore of these great vessels

and how those stories have been translated throughout the ages was also examined in this exhibition.

From July 26 – September 18, we presented the exhibition "So What's in a Bog?"As a Cape Codder, bogs are a major part of the landscape and the economy of the area. This exhibition looked at how artists have portrayed bogs in the 19th, 20th and 21st Century and how the bog is a major part of the landscape. One important part of the program was a bog owner talking about the process of harvesting cranberries on Cape Cod.

Our Halloween exhibition was "Celebration of Life," from September 20 – November 6. The Christian Victorians had a healthy attitude about death because it was such a vital part of their lives. They believed that death was a sleeping time before the second coming.

Our closing exhibition for 2011 from November 8 – December 30, was "Portraits and Their Lives." A great deal of research has been completed on the identities of the portraits in our permanent collection. This exhibition put a spotlight on that research and added other portraits that complimented our paintings and further advanced their stories.

2011 - A Year of Significant Gains and Major Developments

2011 was an important year for the Cahoon Museum, a year of significant gains and major developments.

There were transitions on the Board of Trustees. Most heart-wrenching was the death of Francesca Carriuolo, just after she was elected to her second term. Peter Rohner and Noreen Waters, long-serving and highly valued members, left the Board at the end of their terms and Jennifer Eplett Reilly resigned due to family obligations in her home state of Louisiana.

In 2011, three new members joined the Board. Gwen Dadoly is Managing Director of US Trust Bank of America Private Wealth Management and Market President of Bank of America Cape Cod, the Islands and Southeastern Massachusetts. Mary LeClair, was a Barnstable County Commissioner from 1996 to 2009 and now serves on numerous Cape Cod boards and committees. Kevin Nolan, a potter who apprenticed with Harry Holl of Scargo Pottery and served as principal potter and general manager at Scargo, now heads his own studio, Barnstable Pottery. All three are making major contributions to the work of the Board and the vitality of the Museum.

There were significant additions to the Museum's permanent collection, most notably the purchase of a striking work by Walter Gay (1856-1937). Each year, members of the Cahoon Society are responsible for carefully selecting a special painting that is purchased by the Museum. Also added in 2011 were a painting by Martha Cahoon

donated by Franz and Ruth Cahoon and a chest painted and signed by Ralph Cahoon that was donated by Martha Murphy.

We made major gains in 2011 for a new addition to the Museum. The Board agreed on a design that will preserve and complement the historic character of our existing building. The design was presented at a subcommittee hearing of the Cape Cod Commission in October, where it was unanimously approved. The full Commission added unanimous approval in December. This approval certifies that the design meets the requirements of preserving an existing historic structure and is fully compatible with Barnstable County's Regional Policy Plan and with the Town of Barnstable's Local Comprehensive Plan and municipal development bylaws. By submitting a technically correct design and receiving the approval of the Cape Cod Commission, we took two giant steps toward the realization of our dream - to provide the Museum the space it needs to enhance its programs, care for its collections, and above all to serve its members, friends. and visitors. We will continue to include Information updates in the Museum's newsletter, Spyglass.

We also made important strides

on our capital campaign for the addition. In October, we hired Pam Morrill to direct the fundraising effort. She has given us a range of expertise and a set of organizational skills related to fundraising that we did not have previously. Thanks to Pam, and to Christy Laidlaw, our Membership Coordinator, we have been able to establish the organizational "infrastructure" which is critical to a successful campaign.

We also completed the last steps to finalize an agreement with Mass Development, the state agency that administers a \$400,000 grant for the addition that we received from the Massachusetts Cultural Council. The agreement was finalized in January 2012 and we can now begin to draw on grant funds to cover architectural fees and construction costs. It is also a pleasure to report that the "Art of Dancing" gala, plus year-end gifts, added over \$136,000 to the campaign. Even in its "quiet phase," the campaign is making significant gains and is just over half-way towards its goal.

Many thanks to the Cahoon Museum staff, Board of Trustees and volunteers who work at the highest professional level to ensure that our members, patrons and our community are well served by the exhibitions and educational programs. On our horizon is a museum that will be even more of a pleasure to visit and a joy to wander through than it is already – a Cahoon Museum that will be able to fulfill its mission to "promote love and enjoyment of the visual arts" at a whole new level.

FROM THE DIRECTOR ... Richard Waterhouse

An Exciting Year of Programs at the Cahoon Museum of American Art

It has been another very exciting year for the Cahoon with many programs and services based on our exhibition schedule.

Christy Laidlaw and I
had the privilege to attend
the New England Museum
Association's (NEMA)
Annual Conference in
Harford. We met many of our
colleagues throughout New
England and one of the things
that we kept hearing over and over
was what a wonderful place our
museum is on a regional level.
Everyone was very impressed by
the high quality of exhibitions we
offer and all the programs related
to them.

The Cahoon Museum of American Art's get smART program, whose purpose is to educate and get children excited about the visual arts, had another successful year. Through a grant from JB-S Enterprises, schools in the area were reimbursed for bus trips to the museum and our coordinator provided tours of the current exhibition. The program is 10 years old. We hired a new education coordinator, Deborah Greenwood, to help us increase the visitation of the program and expand educational programs and services for the new building.

The museum's highest membership category is the Cahoon Society. Five hundred dollars of that donation goes towards buying a piece of artwork. In 2011, the Society acquired Walter Gay's (1856-1937) *Doorway*, oil on panel, 16 x 10 ½ inches. The Cahoon Society has been acquiring works since 2003 and this is the 10th work that the Cahoon Society

has purchased for the permanent collection. Other artists' works added to the permanent collection by the Cahoon Society include Erastus Salisbury Field, Homer Dodge Martin and Thomas Waterman Wood.

The Cahoon Museum of
American Art continues to accept
donations that are approved by
the Collections and Exhibitions
Committee. In 2011, they accepted:

We worked with top floral designers on the Cape for the Cahoon in Bloom (August 4-7). Spotlighting fantastic floral displays created by prize-winning floral artists, each unique arrangement represented the designer's personal interpretation of a painting in the "So What's in a Bog?" exhibition. The Cahoon in Bloom event would not be successful without financial support from our generous sponsors. Opportunities are always available to be part of this exciting

event by contacting the museum office.

In 2011, we collaborated with many organizations on Cape Cod including the Barnstable Historical Society, the Sandwich Glass Museum, the Osterville Historical Society & Museum, and Martha's Vineyard Museum to borrow works and information for the following exhibitions: "Celebration of Life: How the

Attitude of Death Changes in the 19th Century", "Mighty Ships and Their Journeys to Beyond" and "Portraits and Their Lives". We plan to work with many others on and off the Cape for 2012.

The museum hosted the organizational meeting for the Association for Gravestone Studies (AGS) Cape Cod and Southeastern New England Chapter in October. This meeting was held in conjunction with the "Celebration of Life: How the Attitude of Death Changes in the 19th Century" exhibition at the Cahoon Museum. We will continue hosting those meetings and the next one will be April, 2012. I also serve on the AGS Board of Directors and continue to discuss ways to collaborate with them.

FROM THE TREASURER... William Dickson

The Cahoon Museum of American Art Has Another Sucessful Year.

The Cahoon financial outlook for 2011 started with a challenge due to the poor local, national and state economic situations. However, the teamwork by the museum staff. trustees, volunteers and members produced acceptable museum results for the year in spite of the poor economic climate.

Revenue support for the Cahoon was helped by success in several key fund-raising categories, especially by an increase in membership due to efforts from a new membership coordinator and the quality of exhibits created by the museum director. This new growth was in all membership



categories including admissions and has led to high expectations for continued increases for 2012. The annual appeal, another major source of museum support, was also positive and exceeded a budgeted increase.

The major museum sources

of revenue are our fundraising programs. The 2011 programs - the Shall We Dance? Gala and the Great Brush Off - exceeded our budgeted expectations and contributed to the favorable operating performance they also provided a significant contribution to the Capital Campaign for our proposed new addition.

In the areas of expense control, the museum staff did an outstanding job managing expenses and keeping the final financial results favorable for the year. The staff and trustees through the loyal support and generosity of its members are optimistic for a strong 2012.


